Wake boats: The Monster Trucks of Wisconsin Lakes

Wake boats have rapidly become a prominent feature on Wisconsin lakes, drawing attention and controversy alike. Known for their powerful engines and ability to create massive wakes, these boats are often likened to monster trucks for their size, power, and disruptive presence on the water. ATV/UTV riders: ride safe this holiday weekend



MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) urges ATV/UTV riders to celebrate the Fourth of July holiday responsibly, ride sober and keep their speed in check.

So far this year, 17 people have been killed in ATV/UTV crashes. Most of them were not wearing seat belts or helmets, and alcohol and speed were also contributing factors.

Choosing to wear the appropriate safety gear and operating responsibly significantly reduces the chance of severe injury or a fatal crash.

"When people mix alcohol, speed and poor decisions with ATVs and UTVs, there are no good outcomes," said Lt. Warden Jacob Holsclaw, DNR off-highway vehicle administrator. "The important thing to remember is that nearly all injury-inducing crashes can be prevented by taking the proper precautions and operating within your capabilities."

One of the best things ATV and UTV operators can do to operate safely is to take an online safety course. A list of approved safety education classes is available on the DNR's Safety Education webpage.

Some additional things to keep in mind when operating your recreational vehicle include:

- Never consume alcohol or drugs before or during your ride.
- Do not travel in unfamiliar areas.
- Follow all posted speed limits and regulatory signs.
- $^{\bullet}\mbox{Let}$ someone not riding with you know where you are going and when you will return.

Wisconsin law also requires every operator involved in a crash incident to report the incident to law enforcement officials without delay. Operators must submit a written report to the DNR within 10 days of the incident.

Holt & Balcom Logging Camp Museum proudly presents a new program "Cate and Jack and the River Rats" on July 13, 2024 at 1 p.m. This presentation will feature Pat Lowery, who just returned from touring in Ireland, and Kathleen and Jon Marsh who will reprise their iconic roles as Cate, Madame of the Red Light Saloon, and her wayward husband Jack.

The program includes a slide presentation that tells the story of thousands of unsung heroes, fearless lumberjacks who extended their seasonal employment during the Big Pine Era. Signing on as log drivers, these legendary supermen were also known as river pigs or river rats. They skillfully navigated a series of dams, streams and rivers to deliver millions of saw logs that would be turned into lumber to build America.

Holt & Balcom's river rats utilized McCauslin Brook and branches of the Oconto River to guide the floating logs to the company's mill in Oconto. Facing unimaginable dangers and hardships almost beyond human endurance, these hardy souls were at the mercy of the weather, swarms of biting insects, perilous rapids, and logjams of epic proportion. Injury or death was always close by, just one miscalculation or careless step away.

You won't want to miss this Learning and Laughter program inspired by *Breakfast in Hell*, a song recorded by Slaid Cleves. Written by Robin Frederick as *The Ballad of Sandy Gray*, the song immortalized a valiant log driver who lost his life clearing a logjam on Ontario's Musquash River in the early 20th Century.

Holt & Balcom, the oldest logging camp in America sitting where in was built in 1881, is located off F in Lakewood within McCauslin Brook Golf Course. Park in the golf course lot; the Museum is behind the Clubhouse. Admission is a minimum donation of \$5 person. (Not suitable for those under 10). Seating is limited. Come early to tour the Museum before the show.

Participating in youth sports can lead to immediate and long-term benefits for children. Unfortunately, sports injuries can, and do, occur.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), more than half of the seven million sports and recreation-related injuries that occur each year are sustained by youth between ages five and 24.

"The most common injuries we see here in youth sports are strains and sprains. Strains being the tearing or stretching of muscle or tendons, and sprains being the tearing or stretching of ligaments," said Zach Furtak, Licensed Athletic Trainer, Aspirus Northland Orthopedics. "Due to the variety of muscles, ligaments, and tendons we have in our body, that is the most common injury we see in youth sports."

However common, there are still several ways to keep children active while also reducing their risk of a sports related injury:

Gear up – Whether during practice or games, athletes should be using protective gear, such as helmets, wrist guards and knee and elbow pads in addition to any other sports gear appropriate to their activity or player position.

Use the right stuff – Be sure that sports protective equipment is maintained correctly and is in good condition. Poorly fitted equipment may be uncomfortable and may not offer proper protection.

Practice makes perfect – Have athletes learn and practice skill sets relevant to their chosen activity. For example, appropriate tackling technique is important in preventing injuries in football and soccer. Correct biomechanics, or movement and alignment, also plays a role in preventing injuries during baseball, softball, and many other activities.

Be well conditioned – Be sure to safely and slowly increase activities to improve physical fitness; being in good condition can protect players from injury.

Hydration and nutrition – Remind athletes to take care of their bodies by making sure they are properly hydrated and eating a well-balanced meal.

Be a good model – Communicate positive messages about safety and serve as role models for safe behavior, including a wearing helmet and following the rules.

Recovery from an injury is different for each athlete. "Some of the basic injuries, days to weeks, some of the more severe injuries weeks to months; all depends on the nature of the injury," added Furtak. "Each injury is different, and each athlete is different in their healing process and the injury itself."

Safety and health should be a top priority for coaches and parents to keep athletes in the game and having fun, this includes listening to players' concerns and identifying injuries.

They can also encourage players to be honest if they are experiencing pain and not to push through it. If an injury does occur, parents and athletes can follow the acronym RICE to aid recovery.

- Rest and protect the injured or sore area.
- Ice or use a cold pack as soon as possible.
- Compression, or wrapping the injured or sore area with an elastic bandage.
- Elevation (propping up) the injured or sore area.

"Coaches should be coaching proper technique, making sure that athlete is doing the right things, not putting themselves in jeopardy to injure themself, having off-season strength training, getting your body ready for the sport at hand, not going into it, not ready for it," added Furtak. "And then while you're in the sport, taking care of your body, strength training, stretching."










For Old Times Sake



This photo is of the Quinlan cottage on Otter Lake, as the inscripotion on the photo says. This was likely in post card format when it was printed in the early 1900's. In fact, if you look at the writing in the upper right corner, this was dated 2/16/07. The Quinlan family lived in one of the big homes on the hill in Wabeno, although when the homes were built, this was Soperton. Quinlan was the secretary of the Menominee Bay Shore sawmill, and the Soper brothers, although they did not live here, wanted their own town for the sawmill, and of course, it was named Soperton. It is now part of Wabeno. Bay Shore was one of two big sawmills in Wabeno, with the other being Jones Lbr. Company, which was located where the grade school is today. Things change!



Northwoods Community Assistance Coalition (NCAC)

Peggy Christianson

On May 15, 2024 over fifty people met at the Lakewood Town Hall to share a meal and celebrate the formal introduction of Northwoods Community Assistance Coalition (NCAC). The NCAC is a coming together of local volunteers and health care providers in Wabeno, Townsend, Lakewood, Mountain, Suring and White Lake with the goal of helping those in need. The foundation for this group was laid over four years ago.

It was February 2020. The world was mired in a pandemic caused by a "novel corona virus" (COVID) that would sicken over a hundred million Americans and take at least 1.2 million lives. Millions of Wisconsinites contracted COVID which has claimed at least 17,000 lives in the Badger State. It was a health care catastrophe. People wanted to help, but no one knew what to do.

Into the void stepped a cadre of volunteers in Northern Oconto County. Led by Lakewood Nurse Practitioner Peggy Christianson, their efforts reached multiple communities. They made over eight thousand cloth masks, some of which were shipped as far away as Saudi Arabia. They delivered meals, provided transportation, and furnished whatever they could to support those in need.

Just like COVID, the group has mutated over time. It expanded its reach, drew in more and more volunteers, and relied on the generosity of locals who contributed badly needed funding. They continue to provide meals, rides, and temporary financial assistance in emergencies. They built wheelchair ramps, installed handrails, and loaned medical equipment to facilitate safe mobility. Some mobilized an effort to "adopt" local restaurants, purchasing take-out meals and buying gift certificates that would provide critical income during those dark days.

The NCAC is in the process of becoming a 501(c)(3) which is essential to securing grants to further its mission. The group has lofty goals with bigger projects in the planning and development stage. Want to help? 





Seeing Double: Understanding and addressing **Double Vision**

Eyesight is a precious gift we rely on every day for tasks big and small. From pouring morning coffee to driving to work, our eyes play a crucial role in navigating the world around us. However, for some, our eyes struggle to keep up with the demand, resulting in blurred or double vision by the end of the day.

In recognition of Low Vision Awareness Month in

February, Amanda Whipple, an occupational therapist specializing in low vision rehabilitation at Aspirus Plover Clinic, and Kaylin Kostuchowski, an occupational therapy graduate student at Carroll University completing her internship with Aspirus, emphasize the importance of acknowledging visual impairments that extend beyond traditional corrective measures like glasses, contacts, medicine, or surgery.

"These impairments can significantly impact our ability to perform everyday tasks," notes Whipple. "For some, ing or performing close work can cause headaches, blurred, or even double vision. There are many o symptoms; but sometimes, it is a matter of the eye muscles not being strong enough to perform these tasks for as long as

Double vision, or diplopia, can present in different forms, including side-by-side, overlapping, or diagonal images. Whipple and Kostuchowski identify common causes:

Muscle Weakness: Fatigued eye muscles struggle to coordinate, resulting in blurred or doubled vision. This fatigue may also trigger headaches when the eyes exert themselves excessively.

Convergence Insufficiency: Impaired nerve or muscle function can lead to the splitting of images. This condition, common in individuals with Parkinson's disease or children with coordination difficulties, hampers the eyes' ability to focus together, particularly on nearby objects.

"Convergence insufficiency is common in individuals with Parkinson's disease or children facing coordination challenges," explains Kostuchowski. ""After trauma, like neurosurgery or concussion, one eye may tire and drift outward when trying to focus on an object, leading to blurred or double vision."

Digital Eye Strain: Prolonged screen exposure can strain the eyes, resulting in blurred vision, diplopia, or headaches. This has contributed to a rise in diagnoses of convergence insufficiency and diplopia in recent years.

"When children struggle with close tasks like reading or homework, it can interfere with their learning process," adds Whipple. "Similarly, adults may encounter difficulties reading labels at the grocery story, managing their medications, or paying their bills, affecting their daily routines."

To combat these challenges, low vision rehabilitation offers promising solutions. It can help retrain the eyes and brain to work together more efficiently, strengthening visual pathways and enhancing daily tasks like reading, writing, and driving.

Whipple emphasizes the importance of consulting an eye doctor before participating in low vision therapy, ensuring the eyes are healthy and ready for rehabilitation.

retreat often find wake boats disruptive. The noise and waves can be intrusive, leading to tensions between different groups of lake users.

Economically, the presence of wake boats has spurred growth in related industries. Boat dealerships, repair shops, and water sports equipment suppliers have seen a surge in business. Waterfront properties that cater to wakeboarding and wake surfing enthusiasts have increased in value, contributing positively to local economies.

In response to the growing concerns, several Wisconsin communities and lake associations have started implementing regulations to mitigate the negative impacts of wake boats. These measures include restricted zones where wake boats are not allowed, speed limits, and designated times for water sports activities. The goal is to balance the interests of all lake users while preserving the health of the aquatic environment.

Moreover, educational initiatives are being promoted to raise awareness among wake boat operators about responsible boating practices. By encouraging boaters to respect no-wake zones and maintain a safe distance from the shore, these initiatives aim to reduce the environmental footprint of wake boats.


