Decline in Monarch Butterflies

You may have noticed that there aren't as many Monarch Butterflies flying around this summer. Monarchs are known for their impressive fall migration of up to 3,000 miles down to southern Mexico. The monarch's



population has been in decline since the 1990's, due to factors like weather, habitat loss, and climate change. However, our recent fall/winter in 2023-2024, is likely the cause for the extremely low population that we are seeing this summer. It is estimated that the winter population seen down in Mexico had declined 59% from the previous year. Warmer temperatures are having a negative effect on how monarch populations develop. In recent years, temperatures that remained higher later into September led to fewer monarchs being able to reach overwintering sites, because it took too long for them to get there. Because of those warmer temperatures last fall, it was drier and flowers weren't available. Meaning some of the nectar they needed on their migration back to Mexico for overwintering, wasn't there. In 2013-2014 monarchs also had a devastating winter where their population was the lowest on record, but then they rebounded and by 2014-2015 the population had tripled. It is hard to say if there is one main factor causing the decline this year or many different factors such as pesticide use, habitat loss, or climate change. It is important to remember that Monarch caterpillars' primary source of food is Milkweed, so in order for the population to grow when they are here, we need to keep Milkweed growing in our county! 

What You Need to Know About School Vaccination Guidelines

As Wisconsin students prepare for the 2024-2025 school year, new vaccination guidelines are being introduced to enhance health and safety in schools. These updates aim to provide better protection against serious diseases and align with national recommendations.

According to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS), updated requirements include: **Meningococcal Vaccine:** Students entering seventh grade are now required to receive the meningococcal vaccine, with a booster dose needed before entering 12th grade. This vaccine helps protect against serious infections of the brain and spinal cord.

Varicella (Chickenpox) Documentation: Parents can no longer use self-reported chickenpox history to exempt their children from the varicella vaccine requirement. Instead, a diagnosis from a healthcare professional is necessary to prove immunity, ensuring accurate documentation.

In light of these updates, Dr. Natalie Weeks, a Family Medicine Physician at Aspirus Merrill Clinic, emphasizes the broader importance of vaccines: "Vaccines not only protect your child, but they also protect the community at large, especially those who may be immunocompromised or have a harder time fighting off infections." She adds, "We are very lucky to have these vaccines to prevent potentially deadly diseases." The new guidelines take effect immediately for childcare centers, with the first assessment under these criteria scheduled for spring 2025. Miriam Lodge celebrates 100 years on Lake Lucerne (Stone Lake).



In 1923, Marie Schenck, Great Aunt of Ginny Hickman Harbison and Bill Hickman, obtained a parcel of lakeshore property on Stone Lake (now Lake Lucerne) from the Keith & Hiles Lumber Company. Marie was an employee of the company, and lived in the City of Crandon. Not long after obtaining the lake property she felt the need to have a summer cabin, away from the city. It has always been rumored in our family that Dr. Kate Newcomb's husband, Bill, built the family cabin. It became known as Miriam Lodge.

For many years it was a gathering place, not only for Marie and her friends, but our father's family as well. Through time the property passed to my Aunt and Uncle Witte, then to our father and mother Hickman. Now it has passed to Ginny and Bill. Both of us have spent almost every summer of our lives coming to the lake, which was always a special treat for our vacation time. In 2007, the original Miriam Lodge was finally showing its age, and the decision had to be made what to do with the structure. Our father had spoken of possibly rebuilding or at least shoring up the structure, but unfortunately he passed away before any plans could be made. Working with a local builder, Final Touch Construction, the original Miriam Lodge was disassembled and remade into the current year round home. To celebrate the 100 years of a presence on now Lake Lucerne, the families of Ginny Hickman Harbison and Bill Hickman gathered together to commemorate this joyous occasion. It became a real family reunion of sorts, as each family member, young and old, shared their memories of time spent at the lake. Thank you Aunt Marie for your vision of "Lake Life"! DNR Accepting Pre-Applications For **2025 Surface Water Grants**

MADISON, Wis. - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) today announced it will award more than \$6 million to local groups to protect and improve surface water.

Interested and eligible organizations are encouraged to apply for a surface water grant. A preapplication must be submitted by Sept. 15, 2024, to compete for a grant in November.

The DNR's Surface Water Grants Program leverages money from the state conservation fund's water resources account to help local communities accelerate water protection and restoration efforts across Wisconsin. The funding can support a wide range of locally driven projects that invest in watersheds and surface waters. Activities eligible for funding include:

--Organizational capacity building

- --Educational programs on surface water
- --Data collection and ecological assessments
- --Lake and river management planning
- --Water quality improvement
- --Habitat restoration projects
- --Aquatic invasive species prevention and control
- --Conservation easements and land acquisition

Who Is Eligible To Apply For Grant Funding?

Eligible organizations include counties, municipalities, local government units, lake and sanitary districts, natural resource agencies, tribal governing bodies, colleges and school districts, lake associations, nonprofit conservation organizations, river and surface water management organizations and producer-led groups. Individuals are not eligible for grants (with a few exceptions) but may partner with an eligible organization willing to sponsor a project. Reach out to your local environmental grant specialist to confirm your organization's eligibility.

What Funding Is Available?

The amount of funding available varies by project. For example, education projects are eligible for up to \$5,000 in state support, while planning grants are available for up to \$10,000, and larger management plan implementation grants can provide up to \$200,000 per project. Grants operate on a reimbursement basis and require matching funds from 25% to 33% of the total project cost.

How To Apply

Submit a pre-application by Sept. 15. This will connect you to local assistance and ensure you are eligible to submit a final application by Nov. 15. Pre-application forms can be found under the "Applying" tab on the DNR's Surface Water Grants Program webpage. Right-click the link to Surface Water Grant Application Form 8700-284 and download or "save as" to create a copy of the form on your computer. Open the form from your local drive and fill out the sections labeled "preapplication."



This is probable the third or fourth year, and it can be seen that the rear engine vehicles are the most popular for the mud and rocks.








